LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

Welcome to Kāhala Nui's 2024 Annual Report. This past year was one of reflection, change, and continued learning for our community. At times, it brought spirited conversations, tough questions, and differing viewpoints, all signs of a deeply engaged resident body and a team committed to listening and growing. What remained consistent throughout was our shared desire to make Kāhala Nui the best it can be for everyone who calls it home.

In 2024, we undertook a number of initiatives to strengthen that commitment – through capital improvements and social experiences. The pages ahead highlight some of the ways we worked together to support residents and deepen the sense of community that defines life at Kāhala Nui.

Campus Enhancements That Reflect Our Care

After almost 20 years, the hallways of our Kāhala Nui campus underwent a major makeover. Every corridor in Independent Living and Hi'olani received fresh paint and new carpeting. Residents in Hi'olani's nursing units also received new dressers and night stands, bringing the feel of modern aloha to their rooms. Even with year-end delays and supply challenges, our teams managed this refresh with efficiency (page 24).

A Safer Place to Call Home

Resident safety continues to be a cornerstone of our mission. In 2024, we partnered with the Honolulu Fire Department to conduct Independent Living fire drills and reinforce emergency protocols. Thanks to the Charles O. & Anne B. Swanson Endowment for Training and Education, we hosted a mandatory Health & Safety Fair for all associates, reviewing key topics like Sharps Training and Bloodborne Pathogens; Personal Protective Equipment and Universal Precautions; and Fire Safety (page 18). Additional funding from our endowment supported critical CPR training and certification of front-line staff (page 19). Each of these efforts reflect our commitment to protecting the well-being of those in our care.

Connection, Culture, and Community

Life Enrichment reached new heights in 2024. Our Sunset with Friends musical series expanded,



made possible in part by a generous legacy gift from a beloved former resident (page 27). Each performance was designed to bring together Independent Living and Hi'olani residents to celebrate the joy of music, and each other. Cultural excursions and heritage site visits throughout the year kept residents engaged and remained central to our shared experiences (page 10).

Extending Aloha Beyond our Walls

Service and connection extended beyond our main campus, as Independent Living residents deepened relationships with members of our Live Well by Kāhala Nui community and embraced opportunities to give back (page 16). Through our Kāhala Nui Senior Living Foundation, residents visited with kūpuna at the Kōkua Kalih Valley Elder Care Center and Palama Settlement (page 22), enriching lives on both sides. A highlight of the year was participation in a bioremediation project to help restore the health of the Ala Wai Canal, which many fondly remember as a place for fishing and swimming (page 12).

Caring for our residents remains at the core of our mission. Together with our entire Kāhala Nui 'ohana, we will continue working beyond 2024 to provide exceptional sustainable care, meeting the needs of today's residents, while planning thoughtfully for generations to come.

With a focus on holistic well-being, our dedicated team delivers care that prioritizes dignity, independence, and comfort at every stage of aging.

Living Life to the Fullest

Artistic and Educational Pursuits

The Visual Journaling Society (VJS), a resident-led activities group, continued to gather weekly to explore watercolor techniques, creative storytelling, and community art projects under the guidance of art instructor Lori Phillips. One project included designing and painting an intricate and tranquil scene of Hawaii's natural reef and oceanic ecosystem on a guitar.

Educational opportunities also flourished, with guest speaker sessions continuing to bring valuable insights and experiences to the Kāhala Nui community. Residents were particularly inspired by Kahu Heather M. Barfield's presentation on Kaumakapili Church early in the year. This talk sparked such interest that it led to a field trip, allowing residents to experience the historic church firsthand. The success of this visit prompted further excursions throughout 2024, enhancing residents' engagement with local culture and history.

Cultural Heritage and Music

The community's dedication to cultural enrichment continued throughout the year. Regular performances by renowned Hawaiian musicians, including the 'ohana of the late Aunty Genoa Keawe, provided joyful and soulful experiences. Events like the *Sunset with Friends* series, funded in part by the KSLC General Endowment Fund, also continued to be a highlight, offering residents the chance to gather, enjoy diverse musical genres, and strengthen connections within the community.

Social Connection and Special Gatherings

Our Director of Dining Services, Chef Clayton Babas, introduced a High Tea event for single and widowed women which was met with such enthusiasm that it became a recurring gathering, offering opportunities for friendship and fellowship in an elegant setting. The grand opening of The Bistro at Kāhala Nui was another milestone, providing residents with a welcoming social hub where they could enjoy small bites, happy hour, and casual conversation. This popular spot quickly became a cornerstone of community life, enhancing the Kāhala Nui experience with its relaxed and inviting atmosphere.

Environmental Stewardship

In partnership with the Genki Ala Wai Project, 40 residents and associates participated in making "Genki Balls" aimed at restoring the health of the Ala Wai Canal through bioremediation techniques. Residents sifted dirt, mixed in liquid microbials, and packed and dried identical-sized balls that were then released into the canal, contributing to a cleaner and healthier environment. Many residents shared their memories of when they used to fish, swim, and row in the canal.

Hi'olani Care Center Innovations

The Hi'olani Care Center remained dedicated to providing exceptional care and enhancing the resident experience through new programming and innovative therapies. New activities such as Strength and Mobility classes, Music Therapy, and Relaxation sessions promoted physical, emotional, and mental well-being.

Additionally, Hi'olani continued its use of Paro, the therapeutic robotic seal, which was introduced in early 2023. Residents found comfort and companionship in Paro's responsive interactions, which helped reduce stress and stimulate positive emotions. The success of this innovative therapy reinforced the center's commitment to integrating new technologies to enhance resident care.

Live Well is a vibrant alternative to institutional care, supporting seniors who wish to age in place while staying active and connected. Since opening in September 2015, the center has welcomed up to 70 members daily, offering a safe, engaging space filled with social, physical, and cognitive activities. It's a place where older adults build friendships, stay mentally sharp, and combat isolation with joy and purpose.



Recreational Activities

Members stay active and engaged through a variety of programs designed to promote wellness and social connection. From exercise classes and recreation, to cooking demonstrations, interactive technology, and live entertainment, there's always something to spark curiosity and joy.



Dining

Nutritious meals are a key part of well-being. Members enjoy a continental breakfast and a delicious hot lunch, all prepared and delivered daily by the Kāhala Nui kitchen with options tailored to individual dietary needs and preferences.



Facilities and Technology

Our expanded 8,800-square-foot space continues to offer a welcoming and modern environment for relaxation and engagement. Members have access to an updated audiovisual system, a library, Wi-Fi, exercise equipment, and recliners, providing the perfect balance of activity and comfort.

Volunteers

Each day, several Kāhala Nui resident volunteers arrive at Live Well, Kāhala Nui's Senior Day Care Center. These volunteers join the team at 10 a.m. when the supply van brings food and necessary materials for the day's activities. They assist with preparing and serving lunch, washing dishes, and serving beverages. Volunteers also interact directly with Live Well members, brightening their days with friendly conversation.

Health & Safety Fair

In September, Kāhala Nui held its Associate Health & Safety Fair, an engaging and educational event designed to promote workplace safety and overall well-being.

By equipping associates with OSHA-compliant safety education, the event aimed to reduce risks, enhance awareness, and foster a culture of proactive safety across all departments. With approximately 150 associates in attendance, the fair provided valuable insights into injury prevention, health awareness, and best practices for maintaining a safe work environment.

Associates visited various exhibition tables, each focused on different aspects of health, wellness, and injury prevention. Some of the key topics included Sharps Training and Bloodborne Pathogens; Slip, Trips, and Falls Prevention; PPE and Universal Precautions, and Fire Safety. The fair also offered flu vaccinations for preventive care.

Associate Spotlight

Meet Peni Tafuna

At Kāhala Nui, every associate plays a vital role in fostering a safe, supportive, and thriving community. For Peni Tafuna, what started as a role in overnight security has grown into a 12-year journey of service, leadership, and life-saving education. In this interview, he shares his path to Kāhala Nui, the significance of CPR training, and what makes working at Kāhala Nui so rewarding.

So Peni, you are our Resident Services Coordinator. How did you find the job?

One of my old friends from high school was an upperclassman. He saw me working security at McCully Shopping Center, and one day he told me that he was moving to the mainland and said that I should apply to take his place at his job (overnight security) at Kāhala Nui. I applied, and 12 years later here I am.

What do you find most rewarding about working at Kāhala Nui?

It's hard to pinpoint just one thing because I love so many things about my job. Being part of an amazing team, connecting with residents every day, and working in such a beautiful environment, all make my role incredibly rewarding.

What led you to become the CPR trainer at Kāhala Nui?

When I learned that Paul Chang, our former Director of Resident Services and Red Cross CPR trainer, was planning to retire in October 2021, I saw an opportunity—not just to keep the training program going, but also to grow in my own professional development.

Can you explain what CPR is and why it is so important?

CPR, or Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, is a life-saving technique that combines chest compressions and rescue breaths to assist



someone experiencing cardiac arrest. This occurs when the heart stops beating or fails to circulate blood effectively to the brain and other vital organs. In those critical moments, knowing how to respond can mean the difference between life and death. At Kāhala Nui, ensuring our team is equipped with this knowledge is a vital part of our commitment to safety and preparedness.

Who is required to take the CPR class?

CPR certification is required for associates in Nursing, Assisted Living/Memory Support, Resident Services, and Live Well. However, the course is open to any associate who wants to gain this essential skill. We encourage participation because CPR is valuable in both professional and personal settings. Certifications remain valid for two years, after which associates must take a renewal course to stay up to date with the latest guidelines and best practices.

What do you enjoy most about teaching CPR?

Teaching this class has been a deeply rewarding experience. It has allowed me to connect with new associates, reunite with long-time colleagues, and, most importantly, equip people with a skill that can truly save lives. At Kāhala Nui, we believe that learning never stops, and I take great pride in helping to empower our team with the knowledge and confidence to act when it matters most. Knowing that this training could one day save a life makes every session meaningful.

Scholarships

Honoring the 2023-2024 Kāhala Nui A'o Scholars

Kāhala Nui's commitment to education and philanthropy has deep roots that began in 2007 when residents established a scholarship program to support the academic aspirations of associates and their dependents. Over the years, this initiative grew, helping students pursue higher education in fields ranging from nursing and psychology to business administration, fine arts, and medicine.

In 2024, we proudly introduced a new name for our scholarship program: The Kāhala Nui A'o Scholarship Program. In 'Olelo Hawai'i, a'o means "to study, to learn, to teach, and to counsel"—a reflection of our scholars' dedication to academic growth and lifelong learning.

In June 2024, we celebrated the achievements of the 2023-2024 Kāhala Nui A'o Scholars at a special reception, where recipients shared heartfelt testimonials. Many were first-generation college students, whose educational journeys were made possible through this scholarship program. Their stories served as a testament to the power of education and the impact of our collective support. We commend our Kāhala Nui A'o Scholars for their dedication and their pursuit of knowledge and excellence.

CARING FOR OUR COMMUNITY

Community Partners

Since 2008, Kāhala Nui has partnered with six community organizations to extend care beyond our campus, supporting Hawaii's underserved seniors, especially those facing health challenges, financial hardship, or social isolation. Through resident-driven donations, associate involvement, and foundation support, we help fund medical, social, and wellness services, as well as essential resources like housing and meals for those in need.

In 2024, field trips were organized for Residents to visit Kōkua Kalihi Valley (KKV) and Palama Settlement. At KKV's Roots Café, participants learned the health benefits of 'olena or turmeric - how to clean, slice, and prepare it into turmeric milk, cookies, and banana lumpia. Another visit to KKV's Elder Care Center offered a unique opportunity to engage with other kūpuna in the community, while preparing kimchi pancakes, reinforcing the importance of cultural exchange and connection. At Palama Settlement, Residents observed senior programs in action, including line dancing and sewing classes. A session with the Archives Office highlighted the rich history of the facility, followed by a campus tour featuring vibrant murals by World Wide Walls and a visit to Palama's 100-year-old, still-operational swimming pool—a remarkable piece of history that continues to serve the community.

A new holiday initiative "Nourish & Care Drive" for KKV and Project Dana resulted in the collection of 340 pounds of food and toiletry items for local seniors in need. Additionally, a Walk to End Alzheimer's was hosted on-site in collaboration with the Alzheimer's Association, featuring an educational session by Dr. Huidy Shu, Neurologist at Hawai'i Pacific Health, who shared updates on dementia prevention and treatment options available in the state.

The year concluded with the continued tradition of assembling 300 holiday bags for Palama Settlement's homebound seniors. Members of the leadership team participated in the distribution, delivering care packages to seniors living at Mayor Wright Housing and Ka'ahumanu Housing, ensuring that seniors in these communities received essential items and support.

Kāhala Nui remains dedicated to nurturing relationships, fostering stewardship, and creating lasting impact. With continued collaboration and engagement, 2025 promises even more opportunities to support and uplift Hawaii's senior community.

Kāhala Nui Senior Living, Inc. & Affiliates Financial Summary

2024 was a year of refinement. Tasked with finding ways to consolidate, create efficiencies, and save money, our leadership team's commitment to continuous improvement yielded a more than 10% reduction in our traditional operating losses.

Saving money did not translate into cutting corners or sacrificing quality. These savings were the result of contract negotiations, inventory control, and mindfulness of printing. Print savings were \$43K!

Kāhala Nui Senior Living, Inc. & Affiliates Operating Loss was (\$2.5M) an improvement of \$285K over the prior year, while its Change in Net Assets, or more familiarly Net Income, was \$4.6M versus \$17.5M for 2023. The year-over-year reduction in Net Income is due to the recognition of an Obligation to Provide Future Services (FSO) of \$13.2M. This results from estimated future operating expenses exceeding

estimated future operating revenues, due to the land acquisition, as the investment portfolio will be utilized to absorb the incremental debt increase. Our investment portfolio performance was up 12.5% and our endowment portfolio performance was up 12.9%.

During 2024, Kāhala Nui invested \$6.0M in Capital Expenditures back into its facilities. Almost 50%, or \$2.8M, was spent on unit renovations. We spent \$1.8M on the new carpet and paint in all the hallways of independent living, assisted living, memory care and skilled nursing. The remaining funds were spent on new roof piping, equipment and continuing to implement the campus-wide wi-fi project.




Our endowment ended 2024 at a healthy \$12.1M and a total of \$1,433,500 in endowment earnings made a significant impact for residents, associates, and our community. In 2024, we supported nine Kāhala Nui A'o Scholars, each receiving an award up to \$6K per student for the 2024-2025 academic year. Endowment funds supported Community Service projects like the Genki Ball project and the Novare Guitar project. Hula and writing classes were also supported. First-Aid, and CPR training and certification for our front-line staff and a mandatory Health & Safety Fair for all associates were funded. At the Fair, associates covered topics like airborne

pathogens, how to safely work with hazardous materials and fire extinguishers, as well as ways to take care of their mental and physical well-being. In 2024, endowment earnings featured performances by Kenny Endo Ensemble and Fijian Island of Rotuma artist, Skillz FJ, during our "Sunset with Friends" events. Funds continue to support ongoing art and music therapy sessions for Hi'olani Care Center Residents and Live Well by Kāhala Nui Members on a weekly basis. Lastly, just over \$18K in earnings augmented the \$400K from residents for the associates' annual Appreciation Fund.


In Memory of Barbara B. Smith

For over half a century, Barbara B. Smith, Professor Emerita of Music at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, had been a driving force in the cultural and academic life of our state. Her contributions extend far beyond the university, touching countless lives and strengthening the cultural fabric of Hawai'i. As a scholar, educator, and community advocate, she has played a pivotal role in validating and preserving the state's rich multicultural heritage. Barbara's influence reaches deep into various community institutions, including the Honolulu Museum of Art, the Bishop Museum, and the Lili'uokalani Trust. Her dedication to cultural preservation and education has empowered ethnic communities across Hawai'i, helping them develop a stronger sense of identity, and a deeper understanding of their cultural roots. Through her guidance, mentorship, and direct involvement, Barbara founded the Music Department's Ethnomusicology program that has nurtured generations of youth, fostering an appreciation for the diverse traditions that make Hawai'i unique.

Barbara was an original resident of Kāhala Nui who entered in 2005. She shared her philanthropy by facilitating and stewarding a partnership between Kāhala Nui and organizations such as East-West Center, so that top-quality Asian and Pacific Islander artists would perform at Kāhala Nui. The community sadly lost her in July of 2021 at the age of 101, but she left Kāhala Nui with an endowment to continue these performances at Kāhala Nui. In 2024, the Residents were fortunate to experience the impact of the Barbara B. Smith Endowment for Performing Arts firsthand. Thanks to her support, Independent Living and Assisted Living residents were treated to an upbeat and contemporary performance by the renowned Kenny Endo Ensemble and Fijian Island of Rotuma artist, Samuela Konusi Taukave, also known as Skillz FJ, during our "Sunset with Friends" event. Both evenings were a resounding success,

filled with the vibrant sounds of traditional and contemporary music, bringing joy and inspiration to all who attended. It was a beautiful reminder of how Barbara's legacy continues to resonate within our Kāhala Nui community and beyond, bridging generations and bringing people together through the universal language of music.

We are deeply grateful for Barbara B. Smith's enduring contributions to the cultural life of Hawai'i and for her generosity in supporting events that bring joy and enrichment to our Residents. Her legacy serves as an inspiration to us all, and we are honored to celebrate her remarkable achievements.
